At our four Health, Fitness & Aquatics centres in Edmonton, YMCA of Northern Alberta serves more than 12,558 members and counting. The YMCA's role in any community is to identify what people really need to thrive, providing programs and services that will ignite their potential and meet their needs. We are proud that the Northside Community Centre YMCA can offer a place of stable, inclusive connection for youth in Glendale. When children and youth can shine, the future is bright for our community.

YMCA CHILD CARE: WHERE KIDS CAN SHINE

Located at the Boyle Street Plaza in Edmonton, YMCA Shirley Stollery Child Care is situated in a culturally rich neighbourhood with complex needs. Solli Anderberg is the Program Director at Shirley Stollery, and together with her team of YMCA Child Care Educators, she ensures that all children and their families in the surrounding community have a place to belong.

"I love my team, the children and their families," Solli says.

At YMCA Child Care, children are taught integral skills for development such as problem solving, independence and critical thinking, but the skills they learn that impact their local community are just as important: compassion, respect and caring.

"Every single day, we see the children care for one another. They are so eager to help others."

YMCA Shirley Stollery Child Care is one of YMCA of Northern Alberta's 60 child care centres. In every one of these centres, the YMCA's core value of caring is displayed by children and educators.

"By being caring towards others, we show compassion and empathy, which teaches children to be respectful," Solli says.

The Boyle Street Plaza YMCA is a drop-off location for the Edmonton Food Bank and has a Veteran's Food Bank drop-box. The impact that the YMCA has on community members in need is seen and taught by example to the children at Shirley Stollery every day.

"We have started to put out food on Tuesdays for families who are struggling with groceries," Solli explains. "During the warm summer months, we hand out water bottles and snacks to community members who are experiencing homelessness."

Solli and the staff at Shirley Stollery value inclusion for everyone, serving all types of family structures and children with a wide range of needs. "Inclusion and diversity are our biggest strengths. It's what draws families to this location."



The cultural diversity of the Boyle Street community is reflected in the families and children who attend the centre. "[There are] around 22 different languages spoken at Shirley Stollery," Solli estimates. "We've had a lot of newcomers and refugees join our centre. We were able to connect families from the same area with one another to help facilitate connections and a feeling of belonging. Our Educators are going as far as learning simple phrases and words in other languages to help the children who currently don't speak English."

YMCA Shirley Stollery Child Care, and all other YMCA Child Care centres, are creating a safe and caring space for children to learn and grow across Alberta. But, more than that, the YMCA is ensuring that everyone in our communities, regardless of background or circumstances, has a place to belong. Solli and her fellow YMCA Child Care Educators know that caring for communities is something that can be learned, even by the youngest of us.

"They're small leaders," Solli says about the children she works with. "We're truly one big family that cares deeply about everyone."

Annual Revenues

The YMCA fosters the spirit of inclusiveness in the communities we serve while we help families and individuals build strong and lasting connections.

This spirit of belonging can be seen at work in our health, fitness and aquatics centres, community centres, child care centres and outreach programs.

Revenues from Funding Support

Our 2022 annual revenues exceeded \$58.6 million, of which 46%, or \$27.0 million was received in funding support from exceptional donors, government partners, community foundations and funders.
